REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

The Directors have pleasure in submitting the Report and Accounts for the twelve months ending 30th June 2022.

Objects of the charity

The objects of the charity are:

1. The promotion of the Christian faith through the enabling of Christian discipleship and evangelism; and
2. The practical and effective relief of poverty and suffering, particularly but not exclusively in Africa.

Review of Activities

Our work is focused on helping people build community, bringing others to Jesus and overcoming disadvantage. We share and promote the good news of Jesus through the formation of Life Groups: communities on mission together. Life Groups bring people together to learn how to pray and read the Bible. They learn how to work for the benefit of others, bringing life and hope to their community as they target the effective relief of poverty in all its forms. People of any faith or no faith, families and whole communities benefit as unity grows and there is a combined effort to overcome challenges unique to each place.

We focus on situations where people are under-represented, poor and have low education, in geographically or linguistically hard to reach regions or where there is little or no church. We design our methods and materials so those who have the least are the ones who benefit and are reached first.

Life Groups are a beacon of hope in their communities. They have cared for the elderly, given young people a sense of purpose, provided for the poorest, accessed government schemes to benefit the whole village, welcomed the overlooked, supported those who are HIV positive, brought down crime rates, educated people about staying safe during the time of COVID, repaired roofs, roads and bridges, and brought many people to Jesus. Life Groups are predominantly in rural areas of sub-Saharan Africa and are beginning to spread to other nations.

In 2019 we wrote an aspirational 10-year vision to 2029 that imagined: “half a million Life Groups releasing the God-given potential of millions of people to pioneer and work together. Countless people would be set free from poverty of mind, body and spirit. Nations would be transformed. This Kingdom movement could not be ignored. Its impact would be seen on a national level and beyond.”

This gave rise to three key strands within our work:

- Focus on the ‘least’ first (Matthew 25:40) and enable the ‘least’ to plant Life Groups.
- Convince and teach others to plant groups through their own ministry and areas of influence.

- Influence the thinking and wider agenda of God’s people to use and adapt Life Group methodology to release people in their own settings, no matter where in the world they may be operating.

July 2021 to June 2022 - The Headlines:

- Increased number and density of Life Groups in Zambia, but with slower than targeted growth.
- Life Groups in 6 other sub-Saharan nations, many of which have become fast-multiplying clusters of Life Groups.
- 1,042 Life Groups known to be meeting, with strong anecdotal evidence of substantially more.
- 89 people from 9 different nations enrolled to study Village Journey, now available in 5 different languages.
- Many of those studying Village Journey also helped groups of friends to study, and pockets of Life Groups took route in Uganda, Malawi and India.
- A focus on sharing what we have with others, leading to growing partnership and Life Groups on 3 other continents.
- Work began to make all Dignity books and resources available online on a pay what you can or free basis.
- Many stories of Life Groups bringing people to Jesus and responding to the needs of neighbours, friends and communities.

Enabling those with the ‘least’ to plant Life Groups for their area:

As COVID restrictions began lifting at the end of 2021 and into 2022, we were able to understand some of the impact of the last two years. The challenges that the restrictions brought had caused a slowing down in the work of local teams carrying the idea of Life Groups to new areas, leaving some feeling disheartened or frustrated. The need to provide and care for families had taken precedence. In some areas, such as northern Namibia, we understood that whole communities – including Life Groups – had suffered greatly. In many areas we have heard how Life Groups have continued to be a lifeline for the people within them or connected to them, maintaining a sense of togetherness. The restrictions and challenges people have faced have led to imaginative and innovative solutions. Tabitha’s story is one example.

Tabitha’s Story

“Life Group members in Mai Mahiu are loving Tabitha, one of their villagers. They are walking alongside her in her difficult times and this is making her life easier. Gradually Tabitha has come to accept the Lord Jesus Christ as her personal saviour.” – Beatrice, Life Group advocate, Kenya

After a bad accident, Tabitha was left struggling to walk and reliant on her elderly mother to house, feed, and care for her and her four children. A local Life Group began praying for her and visiting her. As they got to know her, they all contributed to cover the cost of medical fees and her son’s school fees. Tabitha is recovering from the accident and the group have helped her move into a home of her own. They continue to support her daily needs. Tabitha has experienced the love of Jesus in action through the Life Group! She has become a Christian and joined a local church.

Throughout the 12 months to June 2022, we were able to resume visits to support and encourage those we had not been able to connect with in person for some time. This included visits to many areas of Zambia and meeting the key contacts from the DRC and Tanzania. We were also able to visit Malawi and begin to pioneer the work of Life Groups there for the first time. In all cases we sought to establish or build on existing relationships and provided training, encouragement and materials.

We continued to provide support remotely for pioneers and Life Groups in Kenya and Namibia.

Our program of translations has been a key aspect of our work to enable people to plant and sustain Life Groups. We completed 10 translations across 4 languages, along with translations of our regular one-page bulletin. We prioritised the production and translation of **Village Journey** and followed this up with additional translations of our **Foundations** course.

We have encouraged, and been encouraged, by those we have spent time with. Repeatedly, we have heard how Life Groups have multiplied, loved those around them and found ways to support others despite the challenges presented by living in a world emerging from a pandemic.

Clive's Story

Clive's bad reputation went before him. Going to church would not have felt like an option as many Christians in his home town would not associate with people like him. His life changed when he found a place of welcome in a Life Group and now his story is very different.

"I am the message. My life has completely changed. I used to be drunk all the time - turning up at weddings and events and causing chaos and confusion. Over time a Life Group befriended me and helped me. My life has completely changed through the message of Jesus. I now lead a Life Group and many people are interested because they see the change in my life. I want to see many Life Groups around my village."

Clive is one of many who are finding freedom from addiction and calling in Jesus through the work of Life Groups. Whole families and communities benefit as individuals leave behind addiction and the destructive traits that often follow it.

Convince and Teach Others to Plant Groups in other areas:

Our work in this area was accelerated by the appointment of a part-time Partnership Pioneer. This role helped us take intentional steps to share our resources and working methods with others leading to growing connections across the world in the United Kingdom, Uganda, India, and the United States.

Through these connections clusters of Life Groups have begun in places that we have not physically visited. We are seeing afresh the power of trusting people within a community to lead the work of Life Groups forward.

The Life Groups born through these connections are already sharing stories of people coming to know Jesus and responding to the practical needs of those around them, ranging from starting a community craft group to supporting a family in the middle of a complex land dispute.

In each of these areas we are privileged to learn from those we are working with as they pick up our working methods and ideas and develop them to suit their own circumstances.

Influence the work of others:

Believing that the best way to work towards our 10-year aspirational vision is to involve others, we began to seek places to share our story, and those of the people we work with. We wanted to inspire, encourage and influence others to use and adapt the Life Group methodology to release people in their own settings, no matter where in the world they may be operating.

We developed relationships with 2 other mission organisations, attended an international Christian mission conference in Uganda and engaged in an ongoing conversation with a handful of churches and organisations in the UK.

We have shared our concepts, models and tools, encouraging others to adapt Life Groups to their own settings with the hope of being a catalyst to other movements of Christian community that bring people to Jesus and overcomes disadvantage, fighting poverty in all its forms. We are seeing signs of this being a fruitful way of working.

Mark & Jennie's Story

Inspired by the stories of Life Groups and informed by our resources, Mark and Jennie planted a Life Group in their community in Miami, Florida and are amazed by what God is doing as a result. A few months after the group began, 16 adults were coming along regularly. They feel that God has been bringing people to them and moving in the lives of the individuals they are meeting with. Inspired by what they were seeing, friends from their church have planted two more Life Groups to reach their own communities. This has surprised and excited Mark and Jennie and they feel that Life Groups could be a great tool to use in their work with the displaced people in Colombia.

Project Grants:

In the 12-months covered by this report, we made grants of £16,182 (£18,977 2021– 18 months to 30 June 2021) to Dignity Zambia Ltd to support the project work managed by them. In addition, we continue to fund significant amounts of project work directly from the UK including the costs of project leadership.

In order to ensure that the funds are being appropriately applied to achieve the objects of Dignity (Worldwide), we receive regular reports on the work done in Zambia (and surrounding areas), the number of Life Groups in operation and a full break down of the financial transactions of Dignity Zambia. One of our directors and trustees, Jon Witt, is also a member of the Dignity Zambia board.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

Based upon the activities mentioned above, the Directors confirm that they have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Commission in exercising their powers or duties.

RELATED PARTIES

Transactions with related parties are set out in note 5 to the accounts.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

During the 12-month period ended 30 June 2022, income totaled £100,691 (£172,121 – 18 months to 30 June 2021) from a combination of gifts, donations and fundraising activities. Expenditure in the period, which is detailed in the Statement of Financial Activities totaled £114,133 (£133,098 – 18 months to 30 June 2021).

RESERVES POLICY

Dignity is a charitable company established in response to a calling from God and as such the board believes that God will be faithful in providing the resources required to fulfill that calling.

The board of Directors review Dignity's reserves policy annually. The purpose of the reserves policy is to smooth out any short-term variations in funding and expenditure to ensure that the charity is able to fulfil its objectives without interruption.

The work of Dignity is project driven with peaks of expenditure corresponding with overseas mission activity. As such the board recognises that the level of general reserves will vary as Dignity builds the funds to undertake this work.

Under normal circumstances the board considers it appropriate to hold reserves of between 2 to 5 months of typical monthly expenditure. Reserves held were within policy levels throughout the period reported on.

GOVERNANCE

A board of Directors who are also the trustees of the Charity governs the Company. Appointment of new directors/trustees is a matter for the whole board. The board would give due consideration to the induction required for any new directors or trustees.

The board meets formally at least four times per year.

RISK STATEMENT

The Directors have reviewed the risks to which the charity is exposed. Appropriate procedures are in place to identify, monitor and review these risks on a regular basis.

DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Directors are responsible for preparing the Report of the Directors and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the Directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the income and expenditure for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- Make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The Directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The Directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions relating to small companies within Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006.

Basis of independent examiner's report



1 Accounting Policies

The accounts have been prepared under the historic cost convention, in accordance with applicable accounting standards and follow the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting by Charities 2005. The following are the accounting policies which have been applied in dealing with material items:-

a) Donated and grant income:

Donated income and grants receivable are taken into account when received by the charity. Income received in circumstances where a claim for repayment of tax has been or will be made to HM Revenue & Customs is grossed up for the tax recoverable. Any amount of tax reclaimed from HM Revenue & Customs but not yet received is shown within the charity's debtors.

b) Other income and expenditure:

Investment income is taken into account when receivable and expenditure, including irrecoverable VAT, when incurred by the charity, regardless of when payment is made. Grants payable are taken into account at the earlier of when they are paid or become constructive obligations. Grants for the support of overseas missionaries are accounted for on the basis of support that relates to the financial year.

c) Funds:

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income received or generated for the objects of the charity without specified purpose and are available for purposes as directed by the directors. Restricted funds are amounts received where the donor has specified the purpose for which it should be used.

d) Fixed assets and depreciation:

Fixed assets acquired for use by the charity are capitalised and depreciated over their estimated useful life unless they cost less than £1,000 when they are written off on purchase.

Depreciation periods are as follows:

Equipment	Between 3 and 7 years
Vehicles	Between 2 and 4 years

e) Taxation

The company is a registered charity and is exempt from taxation under the Income & Corporation Taxes Acts.

f) Cash flow statement

The company has taken advantage of the exemption provided by the Financial Reporting Standard 1 and has not prepared a Cash Flow Statement for the year.

With effect from 1 April 2021, following approval from all Members of the Charity and from the Charity Commission, the charity has employed J Witt, a director and trustee, who had previously provided services to the charity under a service contract. This employment is for his work as a Mission Pioneer and not for his services as a trustee.

During the year, J Witt, received £28,840 in remuneration (£34,093 for services and £7,210 in remuneration - 2021 for the eighteen months ended 30 June 2021). These payments were not for his role as a trustee.

J Witt, along with his family, spent time in Zambia promoting the objectives of the Charity. In the year ended 30 June 2022, J Witt was reimbursed £6,199 for travel expenses and £9,390 for charity activity expenses (combined £11,664 for eighteen months ended 30 June 2021).

No remuneration was paid to any other trustee during the year nor to any person connected to them.
