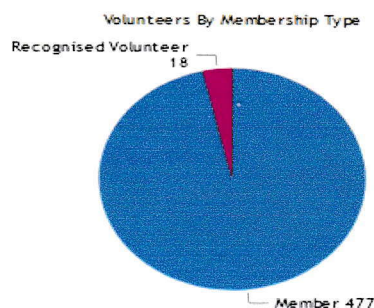
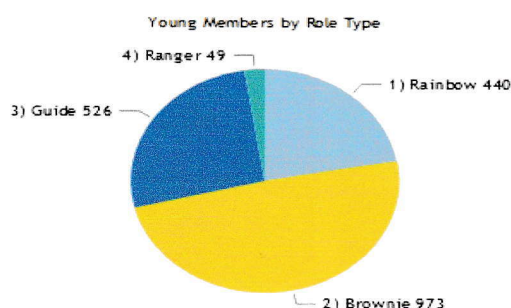

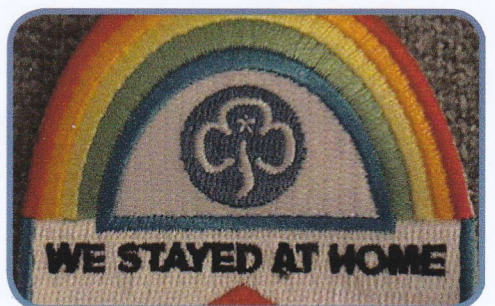

**Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner**
