

The Mencap Strule Buzz Group is a self-advocacy group made up of 9 adults with a learning disability who campaign to have the voices of people with a learning disability heard and to work in their local area to raise awareness, break down barriers and increase the visibility of people with a learning disability.

The group were formed in 1999, which highlights the strength of the group and the dedication of its members to their work. The group have developed and maintained a great relationship with local councillors, MLA's, Health Trust officials and the wider Omagh community.

Summary of activities and achievements

- Various social activities to build and maintain relationships within the group and to promote confidence and independence.
- Members have been involved in working groups within Omagh and Fermanagh District Council to represent people with a learning disability in various consultations and town planning.
- The group took part in a Research Project. The aim was to look into the history of learning disability in the area and what information was available in our local archive (Omagh library) in hope to have an archive on learning disability in Open University. We spent a few hours there been shown the physical archives available- like old newsletters and how accessible they were, we also searched online records with librarians support.
