Objectives and Activities

Food For Thought Africa ("FFTA") was established for the relief of poverty, the advancement of education and to promote the benefit of people who are in need as a result of poverty and lack of resources (the beneficiaries) in Africa (the area of benefit) without distinction of age, gender, disability, sexual orientation, nationality, ethnic identity, political or religious opinion and in particular to:

- a) Provide or assist others in providing food and developing food programmes for the beneficiaries in the area of benefit.
- b) Establish, maintain and manage or co-operate with any local authority in the maintenance of schools or centres for adult learning.
- c) Advance the education of the beneficiaries by providing or assisting in the provision of educational facilities and resources in educational establishments in the area of benefit.
- d) Relieve sickness and distress among people in the area of benefit by any means.
- e) Relieve poverty and hunger in the area of benefit by any charitable means and in particular the provision of grants, loans and training to enable poor people to establish and maintain projects which will enable them to relieve their own poverty.
- f) Relieve unemployment and provide or assist in the provision of housing for those who are in conditions of need in the area of benefit,

This year the main activities undertaken in relation to these purposes were:

Provision of feeding programmes to Kasarini Primary School and Thindigua Primary School, Nairobi, Kenya— purpose a and d.

In setting our objectives and planning our activities for the year the trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission for Northern Ireland's guidance on public benefit to ensure that the activities have helped to achieve the charity's purposes and provide a benefit to the beneficiaries.

Achievements and Performance

This year we were absolutely delighted to get our feeding programme up and running in Thindigua Primary School in Kiambu County in the outskirts of Nairobi.

The feeding programme provides a cooked lunch to 663 children from the surrounding slum areas every day. By providing lunch in school we encourage the children to come to school and get an education which gives them the opportunity to get themselves out of poverty for good.

We know from our experience of running feeding programmes in Africa for 17 years that our feeding programmes cause academic results to improve dramatically which has a positive impact on the child, their family and the whole community.

The project is managed by our former scholarship student Adan Noor who himself benefitted from the feeding programme at Cheleta Primary School and brings the total number of children we are feeding every day to 1123.

The trustees continue to seek new projects and are working with Adan to identify new programmes to support.

Financial Review

The total income for the year was £5,988 raised through voluntary donations with £626 raised through gift aid relief. This represents a decrease of 11% on last year. Donations to Africa were £13,228 with expenses of £896 giving a deficit of £8,147.

The assets and liabilities are set out in the balance sheet with net current assets of £80,260.

Reserves Policy

It is the Board's policy to reserve sufficient funds to ensure the ongoing operations of FFTA for 6 months. At the year end the reserves were above the minimum policy level and this is being reviewed by the trustees, as they continue to identify new programmes, as detailed above.

Structure, Governance and Management

The charity is a trust and governed by a trust deed dated 4th May 2007.

The trust is managed by a board of trustees which shall not be less than 3. A new trustee may be appointed by resolution of a meeting of all the trustees passed by a majority of those present. Meetings of the trustees are held on a regular basis and at least twice in every year. At these meetings accounts are reviewed against budgets and forecasts. Existing projects are discussed and funding for potential projects discussed and authorised.


- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;

Independent examiner's report to the charity trustees of Food for Thought Africa for the year ended 5 April 2024



1. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued in October 2019 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2015.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

Incoming resources

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are being written off over their anticipated useful lives on the following bases:
