A summary of the Charity's main activities to further its purposes for the public benefit and the main achievements in the year

We started back in January 2021 with Zoom meetings.

We started with activities based around the promise.

Over the next few meetings, we worked on a Girlguiding Scotland badge, which allowed the girls a chance to explore the five continents and discover their wonders. Each section of the badge related to one of the Girlguiding Themes, and activities included; building an animal out of household objects, designing a safari vehicle, planning a road trip across North America, creating a Carnival float to represent themselves out of a shoebox, designing a manga character and making a comic strip. We also did some cooking, making ham and cheese jambons, which the Rangers all enjoyed.

We took part in a virtual Thinking Day event alongside the other sections.

May saw Guiding return to face-to-face meetings. We made spirit levels using bottles, water and food colouring, and had a go at building a small rollercoaster car. We also worked on our camping skills by building a shelter out of tarpaulins, bamboo canes and ropes.

After the summer, we started working on the Be Well Skills Builder and began by making some healthy smoothies. Throughout the term we also took part in activities to learn about mental and physical health.

We enjoyed some activities about fairness and inclusion, learning the difference between Equity and Equality, and also thinking about ways of welcoming a more diverse range of people into local Guiding. We learned about politics by using the Parliament Week resource. We also had an outing to Lorne, where we learned about Aboriginal culture and did some Bushcraft.

We finished the year, with a trip to the challenging EscapadeHQ escape rooms in Dundonald.

During all activities the needs of all the girls are taken into account, including those with special dietary requirements or additional needs. There was no harm flowing from the Charities purposes and there was no private benefit.
