Structure and Management

The charity trustees of the congregation are the members of its Kirk Session.

Under the congregation's governing document, The Code, the book of the constitution and government of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, the Kirk Session seeks to watch over and promote the spiritual interest of the congregation and of persons not connected with any congregation who are within its bounds. It ensures pastoral care is in place in the congregation and seeks to further the contribution of the church to Christian witness and service in the community. The Kirk Session has delegated to its Congregational Committee the temporal affairs of the congregation including administering all funds and property belonging to the congregation. Members of the Kirk Session and ex-officio members of the Congregational Committee.

The Kirk Session consists of the ordained minister and the ruling elders of the congregation. All members are entitled to propose, speak and exercise equal votes at meetings, except that the Moderator, the minister in active duty in the congregation, has no deliberative but only a casting vote.

Stated meetings of the Kirk Session are held in February, April, June, September and December.

To be chosen for the office of the eldership in the congregation a person must be a voting member and a regular attendant on its ordinances. The selection of those proposed to be called to the office can be either by the congregation or by the Kirk Session. Members are elected if they obtain two-thirds of those who vote.

Presbytery

Under the Presbyterian Church in Ireland form of governance the corporate oversight of a congregation is the responsibility of a Presbytery which superintends generally the spiritual and temporal affairs of the congregation assigned to it by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. Ballykelly congregation of the Presbyterian Church has been assigned to the Derry and Donegal Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland

The membership of the Presbytery consists mainly of the active ministers of congregations assigned to it by the General Assembly, ministers who have retired from active duty and an elder of the Kirk Session of each congregation.

The General Assembly

The General Assembly is the supreme court of the church, representing in one body the whole church and acting as its supreme legislative, administration and judicial authority, in dealing with all matters brought before it. The general Assembly is normally constituted during the first week in June for worship and to conduct its business. At the end of business, it is dissolved. The membership of the General assembly consists mainly of the active ministers of each congregation, retired ministers and a representative elder appointed by the Kirk Session of each congregation.

Description and Purpose

The charitable purpose of the congregation is the advancement of religion.

Ballykelly Presbyterian Church is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, as a Reformed Church within the wider body of Christ is grounded in the Scriptures, and exists to love and honour God through faith in his Son and by the power of his Spirit, and to enable her members to play their part in fulfilling God's mission to our world.

The Congregations mission purposes is; by the grace of Almighty God to help people of all ages become fully devoted followers of Jesus Christ. Our vision is, by the grace of God, to be an inclusive, welcoming community of Christ's people of all ages, which;

Is increasingly characterised by love for God, and love and concern for others. Is committed to the historic Christian gospel as revealed in the Bible which is relevant to people of this time and place.

The congregation seeks to live out its mission objectives and vision by being;

A Covenant Community; where our relationships are founded in the promises of God by being faithful toward him and one another.

An Intergenerational Community; where adults intentionally take the lead to engage with, encourage and nurture younger members to maturity in Christ.

An outward looking Community; where we want the blessings of God that belong to us in the gospel to become blessings for others beyond the bounds of our community.

As a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, we believe that the Bible is the supreme authority over all we do, and that the Westminster Confession of faith, along with the Larger and Shorter catechisms set out what we understand the bible teaches on key matters of Christian faith and practice.

Activities and Objectives

The congregation meets for worship every Sunday with anyone welcome to come along. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is observed four times during the year. During the year services take place for members of the Deaf Community with a signer. Community events are hosted during the year. There are a number of organisations which meet namely;

The congregation meets for worship each Sunday morning at 11.30am (earlier as announced during July and August).

A more informal family service takes place generally on the third Sunday of each month. Services in Ballykelly are live-streamed to aid those who are unable to attend in person.

Services are led by Rev Philip Houston or visiting speakers from time to time.

We have had three infants baptised in the past year. When the circumstances arose, we gave thanks for faithful service and sought to comfort those who had been bereaved during the year.

At 31st December 2022 there were 362 persons on the Communion Roll and 238 families claiming a connection to the congregation (approx. 718 people).

The average attendance at morning worship was 117 for morning services and 20 for evening Prayer and Praise.

Pastoral Care

Members of the congregation who are unable to attend church due to ill health or age are visited on a regular basis by the minister and the elder who has been allocated to the district where they reside.

Mission and Outreach

At a local level the congregation has supported various missions. By giving to Earl Haig Memorial Fund, Presbyterian Children's Society, Ukraine Moderators Appeal, European Mission Fellowship, PW Mission and Stand by Me.

The congregation fully supports the United Appeal for mission which is a central fund of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland. This fund enables congregations to support the wider mission of the denomination and to do mission and outreach on a denominational basis beyond what the congregation could do on its own.

The United Appeal Fund provides financial support for mission personnel at home and overseas, assists congregations with the deployment of locally based staff, enables church planting, provides grant support for the upkeep of church

buildings, assists with the running costs of Union Theological College, and financially supports congregations in the areas of worship, discipleship, global mission, outreach, leadership and pastoral care. In 2022 £8226 was donated to United Appeal.

Presbytery

The congregation was represented at the regular meetings of the Derry & Donegal Presbytery by our minister and representative elder. This provides an important link between the congregation and the wider structures of the church.

Property

With the building of a new suite of halls completed in September 2013 only minor repairs and maintenance were required in 2022. Repairs to the Meeting House were undertaken costing £5876. To aid the live streaming of services a new audio visual system was installed at a cost of £6958.

Organisations

All organisations that were disrupted due to the Covid-19 restrictions in 2021 returned to their activities in 2022.

Sunday School

The Sunday School meets before Sunday morning worship. They recommenced mid September. The term runs until the beginning of June and then a Summer break is taken during July and August. Sunday School provides basic teaching to what the Bible, and following Jesus, is about.

Circa 70 children are on the register.

Bible Class

Also meets before morning worship on a Sunday for teenagers. 10 young people were present who were taught about the bible, requirements for church membership and communicant preparation. 7 young people attended pre-communion classes with Rev Houston.

Girls Brigade

Meet on a Tuesday night from 6.30pm for ages from 4 to 17. There is a Captain and 12 leaders (4 officers and 8 associates) along with a number of helpers who assist from time to time. Many activities are carried out during the year including away trips and having guest speakers. The year normally begins in Sept and ends in April. 52 girls attend.

Boys Brigade

Meet on a Friday from 6.30pm for ages 4 to 17. There is a Captain and 10 leaders along with a number of helpers who assist from time to time. Many activities take place during the year including away trips and having guest speakers. The year normally begins in Sept and ends in April. There were 45 boys on the register.

PW Presbyterian Women

Meets 6 times normally during the year with 50 ladies approx. on the role. It is both for a Christian focus and also fellowship. The evenings are varied with guest speakers. It is made up of a leader and a committee and affiliated to the Presbyterian Church in Ireland.

Bowling Club

Has around 20 members and is a member of the Limavady and District Indoor Bowling League. It meets on a Monday night for practice and Wednesday night is match night. It is community based in that anyone can join. It is made up of a Captain and committee.

Seniors Lunch Club

Meets monthly from October to May and around 25 persons from the church and local community attend. A three-course lunch is provided and also a speaker or suitable entertainment. The meal is cooked and served by members of the church. The Lunch Club did not meet in 2021 but will recommence in the new year.

Youth at The Manse

Meets on a Sunday evening twice per month. Around 10 teenagers attend for fun, food and learning about how Jesus is relevant to them as they live out their lives. Some guest speakers also come along. The evening is light hearted yet meaningful.

Volunteers

The trustees wish to acknowledge their deep appreciation of those who give freely of their time by serving on committees and helping with organisations and other activities.

Public Benefit Statement

The Presbyterian Church in Ireland meets the public benefit requirement by providing benefit to its members and the general public by making known the Christian Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ through the advancement of religion.

The direct benefits which flow from the purposes of the Church include the gaining of an understanding in Christian beliefs as set out in the Bible and in the Church's subordinate standards (the Westminster Confession of faith and the Shorter and Larger catechisms) leading to spiritual and moral development and opportunities for response to Bible teaching. In turn, this framework leads to practical expressions of Christian beliefs and standards in the local community such as through the care of those in need (including the sick, disabled and bereaved).

Generally, the above benefits are delivered locally by congregations and their members, or are facilitated through Presbyteries or are organised and delivered centrally. Local delivery is facilitated by central resources in almost all cases. Public access is made known through the use of noticeboards, printed material, press advertisement, websites, and social media or in other ways. The Benefits are demonstrated through regular evaluation of the services and informal and ad-hoc feedback from members, their families, and members of the public

The purpose does not lead to harm. The only private benefit flowing from our purpose is related to Ministers, Missionaries, Deaconesses, Irish Mission workers and Lay Agents who receive benefits as a result of their holding office or employment. However, this is incidental and necessary in order to further our charitable purpose. There are no other private benefits. The beneficiaries of this purpose are members, their families, other individuals that the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is in direct and indirect contact with, the community in which pastoral services are provided and other communities throughout Northern Ireland, the Republic of Ireland, and worldwide which benefit from our engagement with and support for both Christian and other secular organisations, charities and individual members of the public.

The Kirk Session has had regard to the Charity Commissions Public benefit requirement statutory guidance.

Financial Review

The congregation's main source of income is our members contributions through the Weekly Freewill Offering. There were 238 families claiming an association with the church (250 in the previous year 2021), 200 of these families contributed to various congregational funds throughout the year. The total income for the year was £140936 (£127,673). The total expenditure for the year was £113423 (£115,579).

The Church held cash funds at the year end of £ 130,530 (£103,017). GIF and RBS share investments were valued at £33363 (£30014).

Statement of Trustee Responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements of the congregation in accordance with applicable law and generally accepted accounting practice.

As the congregation's total income does not exceed £250,000, the Trustees have elected under section 64(3) of the Charities Act (Northern Ireland) 208 to prepare a receipts and payment account and a statement of assets and liabilities.


Trustees Annual Report cont'd


