A summary of the Charity's main activities to further its purposes for the public benefit and the main achievements in the year

15 Girls were part of the unit from January to June 2024. From September to December 2024, 20 girls were members of the unit. Three additional volunteers joined the unit, this has enabled us to enrol more Brownies and we are currently at full capacity.

Throughout 2024, the 2nd Moira Brownie Unit met weekly (term time) in St John's Parish Centre in Moira. The theme for our first term was "Express Myself. This covered a wide range of topics including architecture and design, innovation, invention and art. The Skill Builder badge we did, covered how girls can seek to "Innovate" in order to improve the world around us. Our interest badge for the spring term was "Painting" . During the term we also celebrated St Patricks Day and Chinese New Year, we also marked Mother's day and Easter. One of our meetings was held in a local soft play facility, which was great fun. In March we had a Saturday day trip, when the unit spent a half day at Armagh Planetarium, we built and launched rockets, watched a dome show and explored the exhibition areas.

In May we had our annual Brownie Pack Holiday, staying in Dunluce Guide House in Bushmills for a Brownies Go Wild jungle themed weekend away. We ran a whole range of activities and made full use of the facilities on offer at the guide house. On the Saturday afternoon we caught the bus into Portrush where we visited the playpark, had ice cream and shopped for souvenirs.

The Brownie 2023-24 year was rounded off at the end of May with our annual prize night, when the girls were given their badges and rewarded for all their achievements. Two of our final year girls earned their Brownie Gold Award, which is the highest achievement possible within Brownies. Of the first- and second-year Brownies, eight earned their Silver Award and five their Bronze.

The new Brownie year started in September 2024. Two girls moved up to the 1st Moira Guide Unit. Eight girls joined the 2nd Moira Brownie Unit, all of whom moved up from Rainbows. New Brownies who joined, made their Promise in Moira Demesne before receiving their Promise Badges.

During the autumn/winter term there was a wide variety of badge work undertaken. The theme was "Know Myself". We did a "Local History" interest badge when we had a Titanic themed evening. One of the highlights of the term for the girls was our Pamper and PJ evening . Remembrance Day was marked by a Youth Organisation parade and service at St John's Parish Church, the unit also attended a carol service and had a Christmas Party in December. Before the Christmas break the girls and leaders went to see The Pantomime Snow White, which was held in The Lagan Valley Island Theatre in Lisburn.

There was no harm flowing from the Charities purposes and there was no private benefit.
